Making anticipation work for you . . . Brett Parbery

Horses are so good at recognising and replicating patterns. They know when you, for example, come around a particular corner in canter and you sit up and there's a letter there, there's a good chance you'll be trotting, and so they beat you there. This anticipation can be both negative (working against what you want to achieve) and positive (useful for you).

The key is to harness this ability to remember patterns, and use it to our advantage as trainers.

In other words, we need to train the patterns we want the horse to anticipate.

The horse is going to anticipate something, so we may as well make that work in our favour!

An example of something I'm happy for my horse to anticipate is going from shoulder fore (for example, out of a corner) to shoulder-in. Getting into shoulder-in can be clunky so I'm more than happy for my horse to be always half expecting to move the shoulders inwards. Practising that for me is a positive thing, creating a positive anticipation.

It does also depend greatly on the type of horse you're riding. If your horse gets behind you, then it's a positive anticipation for the horse to be thinking about extended trot out of the collected trot corners. You can simply take that energy and channel it where you need it.

If your horse is the opposite and takes over, then you could train your horse to anticipate coming right back to you and waiting out of every corner.

Now all this becomes a lot more complicated if you're competing frequently because the horses get to know that they can take over for you in parts of the test.


This is one of the reasons I don't like to compete a lot, especially at the lower levels. At the high levels you have way more training tools at your disposal to help with the anticipation.

If you feel you'd like to compete quite frequently for whatever reason (you might simply enjoy it!), and you're having issues with anticipation, you may find it helpful to think about some tests being 'training tests'. This approach is about being strategic with the shows and considering some shows as merely training steps on the way to the shows that are most important to you. If you decide to do this, you'll need to be happy to 'throw' some tests to make the point to your horse that the rules of training don't change just because you're in the competition. For example, you might ride past the letter to make a canter to trot transition, because the horse is expecting to trot there.

Protocol days (sometimes called training or practice days) are really useful to simulate the competition environment, but you'll feel more opportunity to enforce your training rules. You can even often talk through it with the judge.

Don't forget, though, your training may have worked really well and there ends up being nothing to correct in the test!

Have you thought about being a Writer?

Writing, or pencilling, at competitions is essential for competitions, but resources are few and they're sorely needed! It's amazing how much you can learn by listening to a judge comment and score – and it's not hard.

Live scoring through Nominate makes the task easy, using tablets already set up before the competition. It's a case of click and go.

If you want to know more, or have a go, ask to sit in on a couple of tests at a competition to see how it's done or take 10 minutes at lunch time to go through the process with a Writer.

Email your Zone to express an interest – go on, do it!

2023 State Dressage Championships

Eligibility criteria

Qualifying period 30 January 2022 and 29 January 2023

Official horse and rider combination are required to have received scores of 60% or more at the level they have entered for the Championships.

FEI horse and rider combination are required to have received scores of 55% or more for the tour level they are competing in at the State Championships.

Unofficial horse and rider combination are required to have competed at two DTas Events.

Horses/ponies may only compete at their graded level or higher, where eligible.

Heights

As per EA Rule 4.8.3.3 – Heights of Horses and Ponies:

- a) Horses must exceed 149cm with shoes, or 148cm without shoes.
- b) Ponies entered for Competitive pony competition must comply with the regulations for horses in Rule 4.8.1 with the following exceptions and additions:
 - Ponies must not exceed 149cm with shoes or 148cm without shoes
 - Ponies must have a valid height certificate.

Stewards

By 2024 all EA Competitive and Participant dressage events must have an accredited EA Steward on duty.

This means we will need to develop more accredited EA Stewards.

There is a formal process to be followed to become a Steward. Below is a link to the 'How to become a Steward booklet'. Scroll down to the Stewards section to access the information.

Once the new education pathway is finalised, Steward seminars and practical assessment days will be added to the Calendar, and anyone interested can begin the journey.

Infrastructure funds

The SDA has reserved funding for Zones to utilise for infrastructure which consists of levies from each competition, plus an additional \$5,000 set aside for each Zone.

Current amounts at the time of publication are: North-West \$5,704, North \$5,784 and South \$5,844.

EA Equipment Annex – Dressage Update

The EA Dressage Equipment Annex has been updated and placed on the EA website, Version 20, dated 10.9.2022. This version will become effective from 1 January 2023 providing time for athletes and officials to

become familiar with the updated changes, in line with the FEI - Guidelines for use of Tack, Equipment and Dress (update 16 August 2022).

The *EA Dressage Equipment Annex*, Version 19.1, dated 6 July 2021, will remain effective for all National Classes and FEI Level Classes (CDN) until **31 December 2022**.

The FEI Guidelines for use of Tack, Equipment and Dress is effective immediately for all FEI CDI Classes.

The EADC encourage all athletes and officials to ensure they become familiar with the updated annex.

Friendly reminders

- Helmet tagging has been mandatory from 1 July 2022 for all EA affiliated dressage events: <u>Helmet Tagging</u>
 <u>Equestrian Tasmania</u>
- Dressage Tasmania membership is open for the new 2022/23 dressage season via Nominate: <u>Clubs (nominate.com.au)</u>.
- Height certificates are essential for ponies at the State Dressage Championships.
- Numbers at a height of 4cm need to be visible on the horse/pony at all times at dressage events e.g. halters, saddle pads, bridles etc. when in yards, being led/lunged or competing.
