# EQUESTRIAN TASMANIA CHAIR'S ANNUAL <u>REPORT</u>

The ethos of the current Tas Board is that its most important function is to support the equestrian sports.

To that end the Tas Sport and Rec grants are acquitted primarily to the sports for judge and official training in a transparent process.

To meet the challenge of the aging profile of volunteers and lack of numbers we see in the future the role of ET expanding to provide support for each of the sports (the simplest examples being the offer of administrative support at an hourly rate and the facilitation of the support in terms of insurance and workers comp to allow the lawful employment of support workers at events). I suspect that is the inevitable future.

Financially ET is in a very sound position with significant reserves and the present capacity to contribute to a substantial development.

We have had to register for GST because our income has passed the mandatory threshold. Unfortunate but unavoidable.

Part of the reason why we are in such a sound financial position despite having the lowest fees in Australia is due to the large amount of work undertaken by the Board of ET over a long period of time on a voluntary basis and the contribution of Branch Managers.

As Chair I am aware of the contribution of Andrea Watson. It is not only her generosity with her time and availability that I appreciate but her passion and competence.

We are lucky in Tasmania to have a group of competent and committed volunteers that enable the sports and ancillary activities such as Interschools to run successfully.

We have faced challenges this year.

We have had challenges in relation to the operation of the Tas Equestrian Centre. The issues that we have encountered are to be expected as the Centre grows and becomes more

successful. It is now facing the challenge of moving to an operation that needs to meet legal obligations in relation to the way it operates. It will inevitably have challenges as it establishes a sound commercial basis for its operation.

If it did not have the benefit of a huge amount of voluntary labour its costs would skyrocket.

The published accounts show the following:

The total expenses last year were \$52,380. Of that, broadly speaking the only items that were not recurring expenses were the TEC equipment of \$1,625 which was for a Bain Marie, the electric gate which was \$8,573.37 and an amount of \$578 which was for watering infrastructure. As is apparent, however, from the Equestrian Tasmania accounts, direct payments for TEC development of \$6,688 were made. The bulk of this was for urgent electrical works and stabilisation of the shed. Most of this should be attributed to catch up maintenance although it is difficult to be precise when attributing this figure to a budget.

Taking the foregoing into account and the contribution of approximately half the rent by Archery, the annual recurring costs are in the order of \$46,000. The income last year was \$46,408. By way of explanation of the accounts, the figure of \$10,944 designated "lease" is the fees paid by the user groups including Archery who sublease its area from the TEC. The figure of \$12,985 for ground works comprises the cost last year of professional maintenance.

In a budgeting exercise, allowance should be made for replacement of infrastructure that has a limited lifespan. For example, the Enviro cycle will need replacing. A reserve fund which annually accumulates to the ultimate replacement cost would mean that when the replacement is needed, the money is there.

In addition, it may be sensible to budget for improvements.

The requirement to have independent safety audits and a related maintenance program needs to be addressed.

The budget will be the subject of ongoing work but what is clear is that the amount budgeted for recurring annual costs will not get any less.

The process of establishing a fair share of costs between users is an inherently difficult exercise.

To keep costs to a minimum the position was adopted that each of the user groups will maintain their own areas of use, with the TEC Board maintaining and improving common areas.

If the TEC maintains an area it does not have recourse to the voluntary labour of a user group hence its expenses will be higher. Further, the fair allocation of money between areas is an almost impossible exercise.

Where others use an area maintained by a user group, the principle is that the user group will be able to receive a fair contribution from the other users to the maintenance and development cost of that area.

A set of principles designed to ensure all users are guaranteed appropriate fairness in relation to the use of the centre and allocation of fees has been established.

The process by which fees were allocated to users of the Tasmania Equestrian Centre involved all groups being invited to participate in the process. The setting of the total fees that need to be raised and the allocation of those fees between users will be the subject of ongoing review. Any user will be able to put forward a submission as to why they should pay less and how the reduction of fees to that group is to be funded from another source (presumably another group paying more).

A considerable amount of effort has gone into endeavouring to establish a sound financial basis for the TEC to move forward.

My thanks to the TEC Board and all the other volunteers whose hard work makes possible a fantastic facility.

### **Equestrian Australia**

I continue to urge the need for review of the basic premise on which EA operates.

The new EA Board has committed to listen. to those who advocate change. I hope they are listening.

At present EA is based on a federation of states not sports. A federation of sports could (as one of the options) still be delivered through a state-based structure but at least the focus and culture must change.

Focusing on promoting brand Equestrian Australia and equestrianism as opposed to each sport is a fundamental mistake. The brand has some value, but it is minimal compared to the importance of the promotion and advancement of each sport.

EA should focus on its role of governance and regulation and accept that the vast majority of EA members are a member because they need to be in order to compete at a level in dressage, Eventing, showjumping or another sport where membership is compulsory.

It follows from this, that the increase or decrease in EA membership depends on the number of people wanting to compete in the each of the sports at a level where membership is compulsory.

The focus of EA should be on growing the sports rather than itself as a corporate entity. It should not be engaged in activities that are outside its aim of regulating and governance and growing the sports. An example of an activity I believe it ought not engage in is forcing members to take up personal accident insurance particularly as the way it operates offers little benefit to many members. What is critical is to provide indemnity insurance to officials and volunteers.

The consequence of the proposition I am putting is that the way to grow EA is not to focus on EA but rather focus on growing each sport as the primary objective.

The more people wanting to compete in each sport the more EA's membership will grow.

Therefore, the primary objective of EA ought to be the growth and success of each sport.

Equestrian Sports New Zealand (note the name) provides a clear example of the focus and direction Australia ought to be taking.

### **EVENTING REPORT**

Eventing in Tasmania continues to be well supported with events being strongly supported throughout the state. NWEA hosted the North West Eventing Championships again this year on the Murton's property at Wynyard. NTEC hosted the Northern Championships at Quercus and STEA hosted the State Championships at the TEC.

Eventing Australia wide has come under scrutiny with the inquest into the 2 deaths in NSW continuing. The NEC have been very active with working together with EA and the NSO to instigate new rules and protocols to improve safety within our sport. New medical requirements, improvement to XC fence safety, concussion protocols and more detailed reporting have all been instigated to minimise injury to both horse and rider and improve safety within our sport.

We have continued to run squad clinics throughout the year. Both our State and Development Squads have participated in clinics with Prue Barrett. These clinics have been conducted in the north at the Hirst property, Andrew Wilsons indoor at Carrick, in the south at the TEC and the last one was held at Bernadette Gibson's indoor at Deviot. Generally, these clinics have been well supported and are always appreciated by our squad members. We are still very generously supported by Prydes Easifeed and are very thankful to be able to get Prue on a regular basis.

During this year the Tasmanian Eventing Association have purchased a large number of Spiral pins that were provided to each of the zones to be used on the xc courses. These pins are a much safer way of fixing the portable fences securely to the ground and I'm sure each club will benefit from having these available.

As yet we haven't run our usual TD/CD clinic, however, this is planned to be ran in conjunction with one of our first ODE's with our NSO Roger Kane.

Our HOY award this year goes to Austin Williams and Cayuse Walkin Talkin. Unfortunately, Austin and Tex's year was cut short due to injury and we hope to see them both back in the new season.

### THE TASMANIAN EQUESTRIAN CENTRE

The equestrian centre has seen quite a few changes in the past year, not only in investment & infrastructure but also in the short- and long-term development plan for the area.

With the lease due to expire in the next 18 months Tec's focus has been on creating our business plan and the best possible future vision for the park. We are putting our best hoofs forward in regard to infrastructure & development, it is import to be able to show council that we have been investing in, and will continue to develop the grounds in a practical, beneficial and achievable direction for all that use the park. The business plan has incorporated TEC common area developments and user groups projections for individual user group areas. Plans and funding are being sources for an all-weather 80x80 meter arena, and a proposal is being put in place for club room developments and upgrades. TEC has also been spending a considerable amount of time in consultation with Clarence City council on their Ross Common master plan and strategic plan, expectations for the park over the next 10 years are been developed. These visions are not only exciting but somewhat achievable.

With the centre growing, changes & developments to the ETA's / TEC management plan & structure have also been made, the introduction of user group payment plans and the fundamentals Principles have been put in place

In regards to infrastructure things are moving forward, as part of tecs development plan another 24 amazing yards have been built - A massive thank you must go out to Craig and Andrea Watson who pretty much gave up all their time and energy on possibly the hottest days of the year (actually in history) that Tassie could throw at them to organise and build these. Without such generous efforts from volunteers such as them things at the park simply do not happen. The Old Wash bay repairs have been done and the new double wash bay is underway. The expansion of the car park is due to start this month which will ensure that we have much better access to the park in the wetter times of the year. A successful grant application has ensured the park now has a defibrillator unit, that will be in the men's toilets, while hopefully never needing to be used this will make safety at the park one step better.

Tec needs to continue to grow and develop, I hope in the coming year members and user groups can work together to make the visions we have for the park come to fruition as we continue to utilities the fantastic area we are lucky enough to have.

A Coaches update and CE/SSTA Workshop is to be held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> August with several experts in all disciplines. This should provide knowledge and networking opportunities with National and State entities, experts and peers. By the time this report is published it will have happened.

We are in the process of identifying coaches that may need to finish certain modules to attain accreditation and those that may wish to commence training for a higher level.

Again, my appreciation to fellow committee members and the Etas board for their ongoing support.
